Writing Persuasively in Stage 2 Classrooms



It was such a joy to visit Year 4 as Mrs Brooke- Smith taught a fantastic demonstration lesson. The lesson began with the students brainstorming the success criteria for writing a persuasive text. This ensured the students were very clear about the goal of the lesson and what success would look like. Co- constructing the success criteria with the students in this way gave them an opportunity to connect prior learning with new learning, as they were able to reflect on what they already knew about writing persuasive text. Mrs Brooke-Smith could then use questioning to deepen the students' understanding.

The students were then involved in a polarised debate around the topic, *Should children play sport?* This meant they could sit on one side of the room, depending on what view they took, or they could sit in the middle if they liked both sides or were undecided. As the students provided reasons for and against the topic, they could move their position. Mrs Brooke-Smith asked probing questions to elicit deeper thinking and more detailed responses.

The students recapped how to write an introduction and began by writing an introduction with a rhetorical question, an opinion and a brief statement outlining the 3 main arguments that they were going to expand on.

Students also referred back to their personal learning goals to ensure they were improving in this area as well.

Afterwards students discussed how they could 'bump up' their work – such as using complex sentences, sophisticated punctuation, persuasive techniques or further examples.

It was a highly effective and enjoyable lesson, clearly evidenced by students' oral and written responses.

Keep coughing kids home and see your GP.

Whooping cough (also called pertussis) began increasing across NSW towards the end of 2018, especially in children between the ages of 5 and 14 years. NSW Health anticipates that this increase will continue into 2019.

School-aged children who are infected with whooping cough usually experience a troubling cough that can persist for months, but they rarely get severe illness. However they can spread the infection to younger siblings and other more vulnerable people, who are at higher risk of severe disease. Whooping cough can be a life threatening infection in babies.

What can you do to prevent whooping cough?

- 1. Make sure vaccinations are up to date for all family members
- 2. Be alert for symptoms of whooping cough
- 3. Keep coughing kids home, to prevent them spreading the infection to others, and see your GP to get them tested for whooping cough

NAPLAN 2019

The NAPLAN (National Assessment Program Literacy and Numeracy) tests will be held at our school from Tuesday 14 May until Friday 24 May. (A detailed test timetable will be published in the newsletter next term.) Students in Years 3 and 5 participate in four tests: reading, writing, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

Students at John Purchase Public School will sit the NAPLAN online tests, except for the Year 3 writing test, which will be completed on paper.

Parents are invited to use the public demonstration tests with their children, to familiarise themselves with the type of questions and related functionalities available in the NAPLAN online assessment. Please note, that as familiarisation is the aim of this site, there are no published answers to the practice questions shown.

Some of the key features of the online format include a range of question types, onscreen tools, timers and interactive navigation. Students are encouraged to try all the tests for their year level to practise the complete range of question formats available in the online assessment.

NAPLAN tests provide point-in-time information in relation to student performance and are intended to complement the existing range of school-based assessments. While our students will be provided with an opportunity to become familiar with the test format and online platform, we do not recommend excessive practice.

Formal exemption from the test program may be available to non-English speaking students who have recently arrived in Australia, or for students with a disability. Please refer to the exemption form, which will be emailed home to all parents of Year 3 and Year 5 students. All exemptions must be discussed with the principal.

Additionally, there are adjustments which may be made to the testing program, based on pre-identified student need. These adjustments would reflect the kind of support and assistance already provided for assessment in the classroom. If your child is eligible for test adjustment consideration, our Learning and Support Team, will send home the relevant parent consent form, which should be returned to school by 3 May.

NAPLAN Online – information for parents and carers

Why do students do NAPLAN?

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) assesses literacy and numeracy skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life. Students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in the annual NAPLAN tests in reading, writing, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

The assessment provides parents and schools with an understanding of how individual students are performing at the time of the tests. NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process - it does not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are meeting important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

What is assessed?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum. All government and non-government education authorities have contributed to the development of NAPLAN materials.

In 2019 most students across Australia will sit NAPLAN online.

Feedback in the first year of NAPLAN Online showed that students engaged well with online assessments. One of the main benefits of NAPLAN Online is tailored (or adaptive) testing, where the test automatically adapts to a student's test performance. The test presents questions of higher or lower complexity, depending on a student's performance.

Tailored (or adaptive) testing is designed to assess a wider range of student abilities and to measure student achievement more precisely. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions more challenging than usual; they may be taking a more complex test pathway. A student's overall NAPLAN score is based on the number and complexity of questions they answer correctly. NAPLAN Online is not a test of keyboard skills. There are variations in how fast and well a student can type – just as there are variations in how fast and well a student can write by hand. Year 3 students will complete the writing test on paper.

How can I help my child prepare?

Help your child prepare by reassuring them that NAPLAN is just one part of their school program, and by reminding them on the day to simply try their best. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance. Ensuring students are familiar with using devices, typing on them and navigating through programs are a part of student learning and a requirement of the Australian Curriculum from the first year at school.

ACARA does not recommend excessive preparation for NAPLAN or the use of coaching providers. NAPLAN is about assessing learning progress in literacy and numeracy.

Will my child sit NAPLAN on paper or online?

In 2019, your child will sit the NAPLAN online tests. However, children in some other schools across Australia will sit the NAPLAN paper tests this year. Federal, state and territory education ministers have agreed that all schools will move online by 2020. State and territory education authorities will determine when their schools move online.

As students are assessed on the same literacy and numeracy curriculum content, regardless of whether they complete the test online or on paper, results for both formats can be reported on the same NAPLAN assessment scale. To find out more about NAPLAN Online, visit nap.edu.au

Participation in NAPLAN

All students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 are expected to participate in the annual NAPLAN assessment.

Students with disability may qualify for adjustments that reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments. You should first discuss the use of any disability adjustments for your child with your child's teacher.

A formal exemption may be granted for a student with disability that severely limits their capacity to participate in the assessment, or for a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on NAPLAN Online disability adjustments or the process required to gain a formal exemption.

NAPLAN Online 2019 timetable

The assessment window for NAPLAN Online is extended from three days provided for the paper test to nine days. This is to give schools more flexibility in scheduling and accommodate schools that may have fewer devices. The NAPLAN Online assessment window starts on Tuesday 14 May and finishes on Friday 24 May 2019.

The online tests must be taken in the following order:

What if my child is absent from school on assessment days?

Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the school's test schedule. Individual students are not permitted to sit NAPLAN online tests after Friday 24 May 2019.

How is my child's performance measured?

Individual student performance is shown on a national achievement scale for each assessment. A result at the national minimum standard indicates that the student has demonstrated the basic literacy and numeracy skills needed to participate fully in that year level.

A NAPLAN individual student report will be issued by your child's school later in the year. If you do not receive a report, you should contact your child's school.

How are NAPLAN results used?

- Students and parents may use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to better identify students who would benefit from greater challenges or extra support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and areas to improve in teaching programs, and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review programs and support offered to schools.
- The community can see average school NAPLAN results at myschool.edu.eu

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FROM THE TEACHERS

OPPORTUNITY CLASSES 2020

Opportunity classes form part of the NSW Department of Education's commitment to identify and provide a range of opportunities for gifted and talented students in NSW. Parents apply for opportunity class placement when their child is in Year 4. It is a two-year placement program. Successful students may leave their current school at the end of Year 4 to attend a school with an opportunity class.

How are students ranked for opportunity class entry?

All students are ranked and placed in order of academic merit. Academic merit is determined mainly by combining the results of primary school assessments in English and mathematics and the Opportunity Class Placement Test. This combination is expressed as a calculated placement score out of 300. For some applicants, extra information is requested. For example, the Report of academic merit must be completed for interstate and overseas applicants.

School assessment scores

The primary school gives school assessment scores to show each student's achievement on the school curriculum in English and mathematics in Year 4. The scores are scaled (moderated) according to the performance in the Opportunity Class Placement Test of the candidates from the child's primary school. This means the moderated school assessment scores can be compared with those of all other applicants in NSW and gives them equal weighting with the English and mathematics test scores. If students do not have school assessment scores that can be moderated, only their test scores will be used to calculate their final placement score. Government school principals provide scores to the Unit online.

If you would like to have your child considered for Year 5 opportunity class entry in 2020, you will need to complete the following steps:

- 1. Complete the 'Intention to apply' form by **Friday 3 May 2019** so that the school knows who intends to apply. Please note that this is NOT an application for entry. You can collect a copy of the form from the front office.
- Register and apply for an online application through the High Performing Students Application website. Detailed instructions on how to apply online will be available closer to the time applications open in April at <u>https://education.nsw.gov.au/public-schools/selective-high-schoolsand-opportunity-classes/year-5</u>. The application website opens on **30 April 2019** and closes on **17 May 2019 at 5pm**. No late applications will be accepted.

Parents/carers are responsible for checking the school newsletter and the High Performing Students Application website regularly for updates all the way through the application and placement process. Please check the website and Facebook for up to date information before you contact the Unit.

Communicating effectively with your children

It is important to discuss bullying with your children on a regular basis. Regular communication with a person they trust and respect will help them form their own opinions and beliefs about bullying. Your children will also feel more comfortable telling you if they are being bullied.

Consider trying some of these ideas to improve the way you talk with your children about tricky issues.

Sit shoulder-to-shoulder or walk with your child as you talk

• Talking face-to-face can be quite confrontational, particularly for boys. Sitting or walking side by side will encourage both you and your child to talk freely.

Use open-ended questions

• It is easy to ask your child if they had a good day or if they would like toast for breakfast; however these questions only require a yes or no answer.

• Try asking questions such as "What did you do today?" or "What would you like for breakfast?" These types of questions encourage discussion between you and your child.

Talk with your children about what to do rather than what not to do

• It is common for us to focus on negative behaviour, such as "don't step in that puddle" or "stop swinging on your chair".

Try telling your children what you would like them to do rather than what you don't want them to do.
You can do this by using positive statements such as "please step over the puddle" or "please put the chair legs on the floor".

Students can also log in directly to the <u>PRC website</u> using their Department of Education (DoE) username and password. These are the same details a student would use to access the <u>Student Portal</u> and the computer network at school. If you are unaware of your username and/or password, please contact your class teacher and ask for your Student Portal username and/or password.

You must complete your online Student Reading Record by 30 August 2019 (11:59 pm) to complete the Challenge.
