#### **Free Parent Seminar**

#### Does your child spend too much time on the internet? How can I support my child/ren?

Earlier in the year, one of our parents, entered a competition and won a free parent seminar for our JPPS parents. Brad Marshall is the Unplugged Psychologist and a director of Internet Addiction Clinics. Many parents from our school supported the competition by voting for it online.

The seminar Brad Marshall will present is usually valued at \$1500 but is free for our parents. This parent seminar will provide parents with the "psychological underpinnings" that drive the addictive nature of gaming, social media and online gambling. It will then arm parents with concrete strategies to manage screen time and common "trouble shooting" tips he has developed over years of working in the field of gaming and internet addiction.

The seminar will be held in the school annexe at 6.30pm on Wednesday 4 September.

#### Woo's Wonderful World of Maths

Last Friday, the students in 5K were treated to a visit from Eddie Woo, renowned Maths teacher from Cherrybrook Technology High School and nominee for 2018 Australian of the Year. The students had been studying sections of his book, *Woo's Wonderful World of Maths,* and had prepared questions for him based on the book.

Mr Kerrigan wanted students to ask questions that were thought provoking and provided a deeper understanding of the philosophies and

theories underpinning the book. To assist the students he had prepared a scaffold which led the students to assess the depth of their questions they had been asking. It's so rewarding to see our students increasingly becoming assessment capable and selfregulated learners.

Mr Woo provided some great tips and advice for writing, which the students can now reflect on as they begin writing their own books. One of Eddie's comments which resonated was, *My favourite thing is to write for myself and write for others*.

#### LOST PROPERTY

We are only half way through the term and our lost property bins are already overflowing! Please take the time to check the labels on your child's cardigans, jumpers, hats and other belongings to:

- a) check that the item does belong to your child, as it is not uncommon for children to mistakenly pick up an identical jumper to their own and wear it home.
- b) check that your child's name and current class remain clearly visible. Most of the items in the lost property box are unnamed.

The K – 2 children are encouraged to place their jumpers and other belongings in their class baskets if they take them off at break times. These are then taken back to classrooms and children place them in their school bags. Students in Years 3 to 6 are encouraged to return their items directly to their classrooms and bags.

As we have so much lost property, it would be wonderful to have volunteer parents to help by sorting these into named and unnamed piles so we can return the named items as soon as possible. Ideally we would



have a group of parents so that someone could be rostered on each day to ensure items are returned swiftly. If you can assist please contact Mrs Cattell in the office.

#### **Peer Support**

Shared spaces around the school, such as the playground and annexe, were buzzing last Wednesday afternoon, as the first peer support lesson began.

Our senior students have undertaken training to equip them with the skills and understandings to lead their allocated multi-age group of students through a series of interactive and enjoyable sessions. These sessions have been designed to foster student wellbeing.

# Ethics classes at John Purchase Public School

Dear Parents and Carers,

Could you be an ethics teacher for John Purchase Public School?

We are seeking volunteers so that we can provide ethics classes for all the families who have requested it for their children.

Ethics teachers receive full training by Primary Ethics, the not-for-profit organization approved to design curriculum and training for the ethics program. Training consists of a two-day workshop and short online modules. Lesson materials are provided. Suitable volunteers have an interest in children's education and development of critical thinking skills and must be available at 11:30am or 12:00/ Tuesdays each week.

In ethics classes, children learn how to think logically, disagree respectfully and support their arguments with evidence, rather than act according to blind habit or peer pressure.

Children discuss topic such as: -imagining how others feel -how do we treat living things? -what is laziness? -how do we disagree in a respectful way? -fairness
